Welcome to the August 2021 edition of Look East



As this edition went to print, South Australia, like many other parts of the country, was in a COVID 'lockdown', underscoring the ongoing challenge we face as a community during the pandemic.

Up until then, there was a cautious but growing sense of optimism in our City.

Looking ahead, the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters 2021–2022 Budget highlights the Council's strong financial position.

As a level of government, the Council is conscious of its role in the recovery from the pandemic and has committed to large scale infrastructure projects that will create jobs, provide high quality facilities, and improve the health and well-being of our community.

Major upcoming projects include the redevelopment of the Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre, the upgrade of St Peters Street and the redevelopment of Burchell Reserve.

An additional \$11 million will be invested in the renewal of assets such as stormwater infrastructure, footpaths, kerbs and road re-seals, as well as upgrades to playgrounds and sporting fields.

I encourage you to read the Annual Business Plan Summary (see pages 28–37) and details of all of the Council's projects to be undertaken in 2021–2022.

I also encourage you to stay safe and keep in touch with family and loved ones who may be isolated or struggling at this time, so we can get through this difficult phase together.

Ripple effect: Swimming pool revamp

Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre to undergo \$20m redevelopment

The much-loved Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre will be transformed into an exciting water park—delighting swimmers, families and the wider community.

As part of the Council's Swimming Centres Strategy which was endorsed in 2017, the Swimming Centre will be completely redeveloped with two new pools, high platform waterslides and water play areas.

While the Centre is much-loved, it is also desperately in need of major work—with the total cost expected to be about \$20 million.

This funding will make a huge difference in revitalising the Centre—making it even more popular—especially for thrill-seekers who will enjoy the high platform waterslides.

The inclusion of disability access ramps will facilitate the increased use of the existing facilities as well as support greater independence for all patrons.

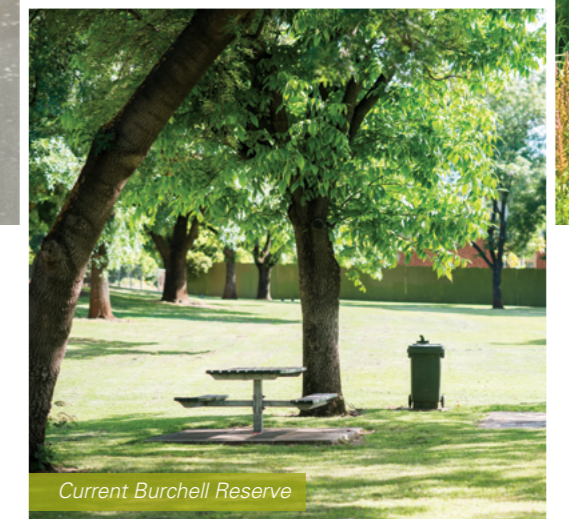
The redevelopment has been made possible by a \$5.6 million grant through the State Government's Local Government Infrastructure Partnership Program.

The ripple effect will also extend far beyond the surface of the pools, with a boost to the local economy by creating jobs and a direct spend on construction.

Work is expected to start in mid-2022.

Whether you love a hit of tennis, shooting a few hoops, or relaxing with family and friends, the redevelopment of Burchell Reserve is set to be a real crowd pleaser.

The key features of the \$2.6 million Burchell Reserve upgrade—which is located at Sixth Avenue, St Peters—includes new:

- multi-purpose courts for tennis, basketball, netball and handball;
- barbeques and picnic shelter;
- play equipment;
- furniture;
- lighting;
- paths; and
- toilets.

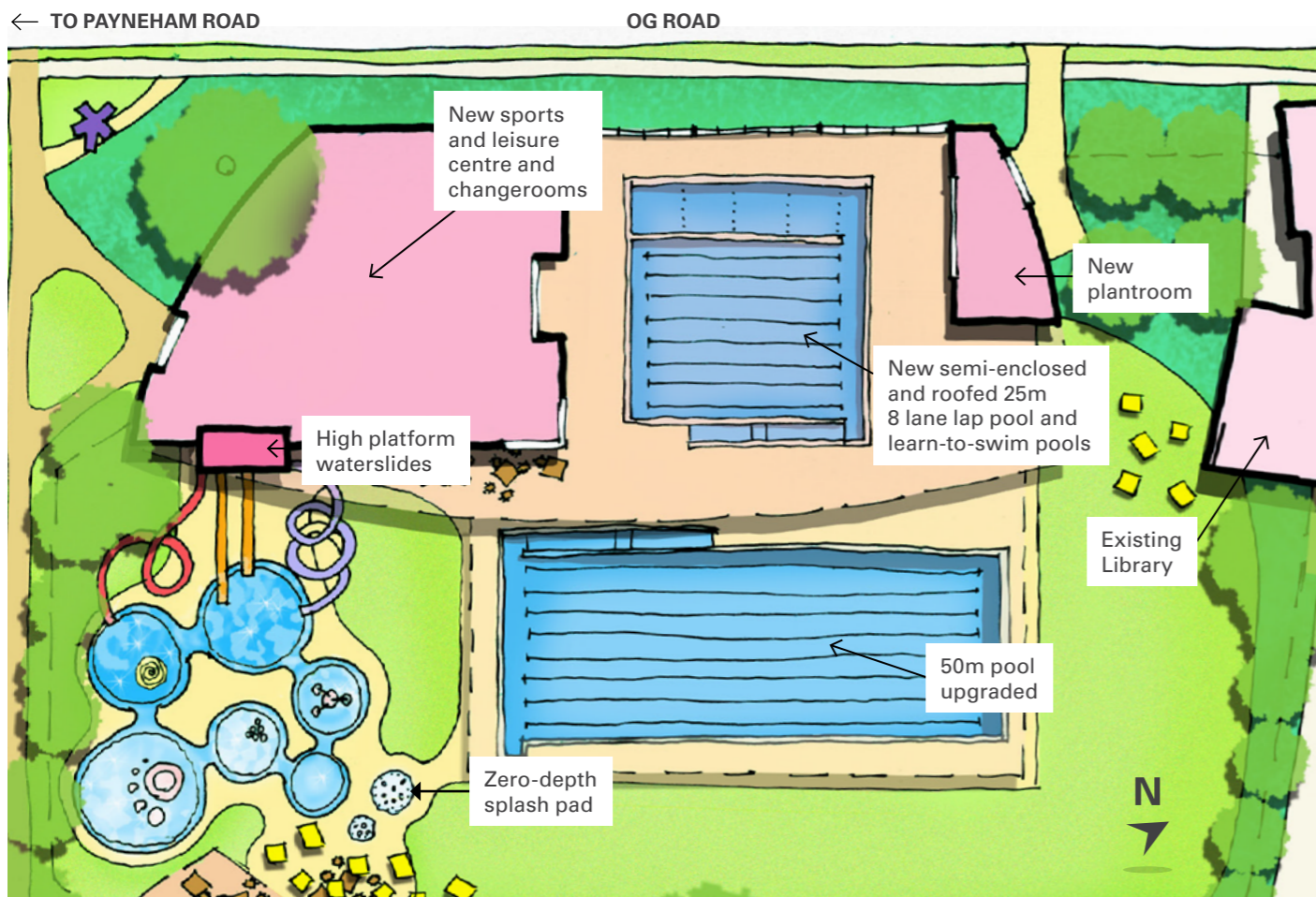
Mayor Bria said he was extremely pleased that the Council could deliver a project that was in such high demand by the community.

"The upgrade will ensure residents and the wider community have great recreational facilities well into the future. It will be the perfect place to gather with family and friends."

"Major projects such as these help to create jobs for the local economy, while enhancing the well-being of our community," he said.

The Council endorsed the Burchell Reserve Masterplan in June 2021. This will form the basis of the upgrade which is expected to be completed in 2022.

New Payneham Oval Tennis Courts

Serving up state-of-the-art tennis courts

Payneham Oval and Buttery Reserve Tennis Courts

Tennis aficionados and casual players have been spoilt for choice with major upgrades recently undertaken at two tennis precincts in our City.

Revamps have been undertaken at both the Payneham Oval and Buttery Reserve Tennis Courts.

The \$1.1 million upgrade of the Payneham Oval Tennis Courts included:

- the reconstruction of six tennis courts;
- installation of new posts and nets;
- provision and installation of LED court lighting;
- perimeter fencing;
- landscaping and paving;
- car parking;
- bench seating; and
- a new shelter and storeroom.

The State Government—through the Office of Recreation and Sport—provided \$375,000 towards the Payneham Oval project and \$450,000 for Buttery Reserve.

The upgrades provide modern playing facilities for the community, and the Norwood Tennis Club and East Adelaide Payneham Tennis Club. The lifespan of these valuable community assets has also been increased by at least 20 years.

Mayor Bria said the Council has a key role in providing, encouraging and facilitating sport, recreation and leisure opportunities within the City that lead to positive health and well-being outcomes for our community.

“Payneham Oval is set to become a recreational destination in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters with the upgrade of the tennis courts,” he said.

“Playing tennis has a wide range of health benefits that make it an ideal physical activity for anyone, at any age.

“So far the response has been fantastic with a lot of positive comments from players—and other community members—who are appreciative of the Council’s role in securing this much-needed funding and then delivering the project.”

The Buttery Reserve Upgrade included four new tennis courts, new lighting, water fountain and landscaping.

Upgrades to our much-loved Playgrounds and Parks

One of the City’s most-loved Playgrounds will be transformed following the installation of new adventure-themed equipment, which is bound to delight children of all ages.

The Dunstan Adventure Playground will undergo a \$1 million development which will include a new shade structure, lighting, public toilets and better path integration with the River Torrens Linear Park.

The redevelopment of the playground—which was constructed in the 1980s—will ensure it stays appealing, safe and practical for many years to come. However, the popular adventure slide will remain!

\$450,000 in funding was provided through the State Government’s Open Space and Places for People Grant Program, with the Council providing \$550,000 for this project.

River Torrens Linear Park

The Council has also received \$1.35 million for Stage 2 of the River Torrens Linear Park Shared Path Enhancement Project from the State Government, with the Council providing \$1.625 million.

Stage 2 involves the completion of the total Project which will extend from Battams Road, Royston Park to Twelftree Reserve, College Park and includes new paths, lighting, signage and line marking.

Stage 1 of this Project was completed by the Council in 2020.

Expansion of Home Library Delivery Service

Book lovers will reap the benefits of the Council's new Home-Delivery Service.

As a result of the COVID-19 pandemic—and when physical access to the Council's Libraries was restricted—a review of the Service was undertaken, resulting in changes to the eligibility criteria which had been in place since 1997.

The Service is now available to many more residents. Customers can use the online catalogue to request their items for a monthly delivery, or Library staff can arrange a tailored monthly package of materials to be delivered.

"The Council's Library Home Delivery Service assists citizens by connecting them with ideas, information and accessible facilities and services," Mayor Bria said.

"The intent of the expanded Service is to facilitate equal access to materials regardless of age, capability, or access to transport services."

The provision of Library Home Delivery Services also assists in combatting social isolation which is often experienced by people who may be frail, or living with an illness or disability who cannot easily visit Library locations or access services.

Book an experience with your local library

Whether it's books, movies, streaming services or free WiFi, the City's three libraries offer something for everyone.

Library at Home is available 24/7 and provides free online e-books, e-magazines, and audiobooks through Overdrive on the Libby App, BorrowBox, and Press Reader.

The Council also has a subscription to the Kanopy streaming service so you can access movies and documentaries.

What about entertainment for the children? The Story Box library has a variety of stories read aloud by well-known entertainers and celebrities such as Eddie Perfect, Emma Watkins or Justine Clarke. There are more than 300 titles to watch and listen to—over and over again!

The Council's Libraries have free WiFi with a daily download limit of 5GB a day. If you are studying or just want to stream, let our WiFi connect you.

The Libraries also have auto-renew. This means physical library loans are now extended automatically if no one else has placed a hold on the items.

An email will be sent to you to let you know the new due date, or you can log in to the catalogue or use the Libraries SA App to confirm due dates.

The Parade Masterplan

a focus on pedestrian experience and amenity

The Parade Masterplan forms the long-term strategic framework for the planning, redevelopment and activation of Adelaide's premier mainstreet, The Parade.

The Masterplan, endorsed by the Council in December 2019, focuses on protecting the identity, appeal and sense of place of Adelaide's premier mainstreet, and the significant economic, social and cultural elements that enhance the experience of people who choose to live, work and visit The Parade.

The prioritisation on pedestrian safety, movement and amenity is one of the primary objectives which the Council is seeking to achieve through The Parade Masterplan. This will be achieved through the delivery of:

- a pedestrian 'scramble crossing' at The Parade and George Street intersection;
- a pedestrian crossing near the Norwood Oval;
- wider footpaths along the full length of The Parade;
- removal of on-street car parking between Edward and George Street;
- additional street trees and landscaping;
- new paving, street furniture and lighting; and
- public art.

The next step towards the delivery of The Parade Masterplan is the detailed design process which includes the preparation of drawings for construction.

The Council is currently in the process of selecting an experienced and qualified consultant to undertake this work.

The implementation of The Parade Masterplan is currently proposed to be staged over a number of years commencing in 2024, with the upgrade to the section of George Street between The Parade and Webbe Street commencing in 2022.

Project timeline



The Council wants all residents, property owners and visitors to The Parade to understand what will change at The Parade and George Street intersection as a result of dedicated right hand turns being installed.

The Council has always wanted a 'scramble crossing' at the intersection. The concept of a 'scramble crossing' is to allow all pedestrian movements to occur at one time, followed by vehicle movements. In turn, this would significantly improve pedestrian safety as well as allowing far improved vehicle movements through the intersection.

After working with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport (DIT) over a four year period in good faith, the 'scramble crossing' was endorsed by DIT. Then, in June 2020, the (former) Minister approved the installation of the 'scramble crossing' on the condition that right hand turns from The Parade into George Street would be prohibited during peak hours.

The Council has never advocated for the banning of right hand turns from The Parade onto George Street.

However, on the basis that the 'scramble crossing' could not be installed without this DIT condition being agreed to by the Council, and on the basis that the bans on right hand turns would be trialled for a 12 month period, the Council agreed to this condition.

However, for reasons unknown to the Council, in September 2020, DIT suddenly changed its position and chose to support two private property owners, who have been given approval to install dedicated right hand turn lanes.

Given the significant and permanent impact which these changes would have on this intersection, the Council had an obligation to represent the views of the community and other traders and therefore pursue the matter in the Supreme Court.

Beautiful and accessible

Upgrade to St Peters Street

Improved safety for pedestrians and cyclists, new trees and renewal of roads and footpaths were the driving forces behind the Council's decision to upgrade St Peters Street.

The St Peters Street Streetscape Upgrade Project is one of many projects being undertaken by the Council.

\$4.5 million is being invested in the upgrade of St Peters Street with \$1.27 million in funding provided by the Federal Government. The key features of the multi-million investment include:

- improved amenity and accessibility for pedestrians and cyclists;
- improved access and amenity of the open space adjacent to Eighth Avenue and the St Peters Billabong;

- new trees and landscaping;
- improved local storm water management; and
- a revitalised central median and wider footpaths.

In addition, \$2.6 million is being invested in the Burchell Reserve Upgrade Project, located in St Peters.

Planning for a smarter future

In 2020, the Council adopted its Smart City Plan.

Since then, some 'smart' initiatives have progressed, while others are still in the planning stage, including:

- inclusion of QR Codes on posters promoting Council events;
- installation of sensors to monitor the number of cyclists using the Norwood Magill Bikeway;
- a pilot smart parking project using technology to monitor the availability

and turn-over of some publicly available parking spaces;

- transitioning the Council's passenger vehicle fleet to low emission vehicles, initially transitioning to hybrid electric vehicles over the next two years and then transitioning to fully electric vehicles by 2026;
- provision of two e-Bikes that staff can use to commute to off-site meetings;
- seeking Expressions of Interest for the installation of Electric Vehicle Charging Stations across the City;
- adoption of an Emissions Reduction Plan including the installation of solar panels and battery storage, where

practicable to offset the Council's usage of grid electricity;

- ensuring smart technology is integrated into future infrastructure upgrade projects;
- use of digital tablets and smart phones on-site to record data and assist in making real-time decisions on development and compliance matters; and
- use of up-to-date digital and street-view imagery to make effective desktop decisions minimising the number of site visits to be conducted.

Charlotte Lane

Relaying of asphalt, new construction of stormwater drainage, line-marking, signage and new street lights.

These are all infrastructure improvements that have been made to Charlotte Lane in Norwood as a result of this private laneway being converted to a public road.

As a private laneway, Charlotte Lane was selected as part of the Council's Private Laneways Conversion Project, which focuses on converting privately owned laneways in poor condition throughout the City to public roads for the benefit of adjoining residents and businesses.

Charlotte Lane was an ideal candidate due to its high residential and commercial usage and its maintenance requirements, with the laneway spanning over 180 metres in length.

Following consultation with adjoining property owners, the Council

declared Charlotte Lane a public road under the *Local Government Act 1999* and resolved to take over ownership and responsibility for its ongoing maintenance.

The capital work upgrades to the laneway were completed in May 2021.

Residents welcome Langman Grove upgrade

The \$1.25 million Langman Grove Reconstruction Project announcement has been welcomed by residents and other road users.

The upgrade will include new stormwater infrastructure at the intersection of Wicks Road and Langman Grove, as well as 200m of new kerbing, 16 new pram ramps, new line marking and medians.

The Langman Grove Road Reconstruction Project is jointly funded by the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters and the Federal Government Roads to Recovery Program and Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program.

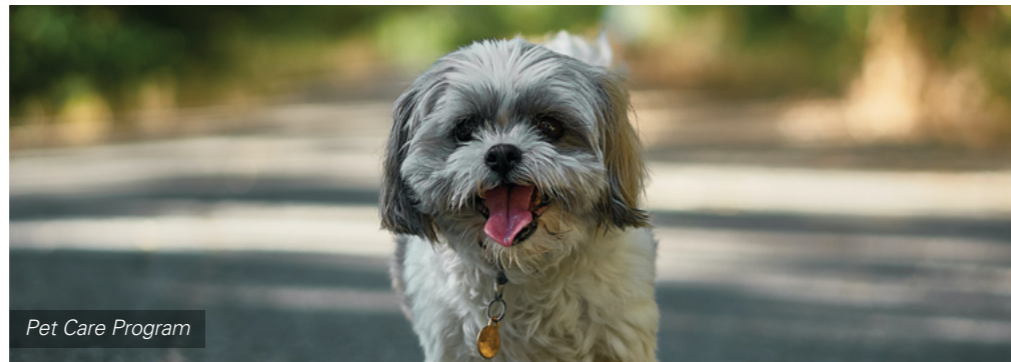
Do you have a dog that would love more walks?

Proposed 40km/h speed reduction

More than 800 ratepayers and residents have expressed their views about whether the speed limit should be reduced from 50km/h to 40km/h within residential streets in Norwood and Kent Town.

The Council undertook the survey in June in response to repeated requests from residents to reduce speeding traffic to improve safety and residential amenity.

The speed limit was reduced to 40km/h in Stepney, Maylands and Evandale in 2019, and the evaluation indicates that overall, speeds have dropped by approximately 4km/hr.

A report is being prepared for the Council detailing the outcomes of the community consultation regarding the proposed 40km/h speed limit in Norwood and Kent Town.

Third Creek Stormwater Project update

The City's stormwater drainage network is one of many infrastructure assets which is provided and maintained by the Council for the community.

Last year, work commenced on Stage 1 of the Third Creek Stormwater Drainage Upgrade Project. The Project forms part of the Council's \$38.4 million program to upgrade the City's stormwater drainage network over the next 15 years.

The \$2.5 million project, which upgraded the section of Third Creek from Payneham Road to Lewis Street, was completed in August 2020.

In April this year, Stage 2 of Third Creek, which included work from Henry Street to Bridge Road, Payneham, was completed.

Residential properties in this area will benefit from the improved stormwater network.

The Council also provided drainage points into the new infrastructure for each property, resulting in increased protection from flooding.

Planning reforms

South Australia's new planning system came into effect on 19 March this year.

The new system, which has been introduced by the State Government, has resulted in a range of changes including the replacement of all Council Development Plans with the state-wide Planning and Design Code.

All new development applications will now be assessed against the planning rules contained in the Code.

Other significant changes include:

- the introduction of an online system which is now operational to lodge, track and process development applications;
- how applications are processed including when neighbours are notified of a proposed development and whether those neighbours have appeal rights;

- who makes decisions about proposed developments (Council staff or Council Assessment Panels, State Government, or private Accredited Professionals); and
- the process for amending planning policies in the Planning and Design Code, including the ability for private land owners to request a re-zoning of their property.

In March of 2020, the hospitality industry was thrown into chaos.
Restaurants, cafes and lunch spots were forced to close and many staff were stood down as the COVID-19 pandemic reached all corners of the globe.

The concept worked by having restaurants cook huge amounts of delicious ready-to-eat restaurant quality food, that would come back to Chefs on Wheels HQ to be packed and then delivered out to hundreds of households.
In another ingenious sign-of-the-times, pilots who had lost their jobs due to the worldwide travel restrictions, filled the roles of much needed delivery drivers.
"By May 2020, we'd sent out over 4,000 orders, collaborated with the best in the industry and people went mad for the food," Annabelle said.
Chefs on Wheels also generously delivered to hundreds of people experiencing homelessness and in quarantine.

Annabelle said when COVID restrictions started to ease, her, Paul and Jimmy pondered the future of their successful COVID start-up.
"We agonised over the decision but in the end we decided to let Chefs on Wheels customers decide our fate.
"We asked the 3000 people who had ordered over lockdown and the answer was a resounding yes! Chefs on Wheels is here to stay."
One year on, Chefs on Wheels is driving towards being one of the largest independently owned ready-made meal companies in Australia and have recently hit the road, delivering to New South Wales, Victoria and Queensland.

Annual Business Plan Summary

The City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters Annual Business Plan is a key document in the Council's overall Strategic Planning Framework.

It sets out the Council's proposed projects, services and programs for the 2021–2022 financial year.

The Annual Business Plan supports the Council's long-term strategic directions, which are outlined in the Council's strategic management plan: *CityPlan 2030: Shaping our Future*,

as well as the Long-term Financial Plan and 'whole-of-life' infrastructure and asset management plans.

The Annual Business Plan and Budget also details the Council's revenue and how it intends to finance the services, programs and projects which it provides for the community.



Strategic Direction

The City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters' Strategic Management Plan, *CityPlan 2030: Shaping Our Future*, provides the framework for all of the Council's decision making with the overall goal of achieving Community Well-being. It was first adopted in 2008, with the Mid Term Review completed in December 2020.

CityPlan 2030 identifies four outcomes which align to make up Community Well-being. These are:

- Social Equity
- Cultural Vitality
- Economic Prosperity
- Environmental Sustainability

Each of the projects, programs and services that the Council delivers meets one or more of these outcomes.

The Annual Business Plan and Budget is a key document in the Council's yearly planning framework, detailing the Council's income and expenditure together with proposed projects, services and programs.

Budget Overview

The 2021–2022 Budget has been developed within the Council’s strategic planning framework which sets the strategic directions, converting these into annual actions and outputs.

The development of the Budget has been undertaken in consultation with Elected Members and Council staff and in consultation with the community

As the State continues to recover from the COVID-19 pandemic, the focus in developing the 2021–2022 Annual Business Plan and Budget, has been on ensuring that the Council maintains the standards of its existing range of services and programs which are aimed at supporting the recovery and delivering the Strategic Objectives outlined in the Council’s Strategic Management Plan *CityPlan 2030: Shaping Our Future*, and that those services and programs receive appropriate funding.

The Budget reflects decisions which have assumed that the physical distancing and gathering restrictions—which were in place last financial year—have been relaxed, with the provision of services, programs and activities being delivered in a COVID-19 safe manner.

As the third tier of government, the Council is supporting the economic and community recovery by undertaking a number of large-scale infrastructure projects, which are aimed to be delivered over the next two financial years.

The 2021–2022 Budget remains focussed on the future and aims to ensure that the Council’s emerging and continuing priorities are appropriately resourced and to this end, the

Budget is built upon the strategic outcomes set out in the Councils’ Asset Management Plans and its Long Term Financial Plan.

The key driver is to ensure that the Budget priorities not only contribute to the Council’s broader strategic objectives, but also the Council’s long term financial objective of managing its financial resources in a sustainable and equitable manner.

The focus continues to be on initiatives which have been identified to support the delivery of the strategic objectives outlined in *CityPlan 2030: Shaping Our Future* and to ensure that our services are delivered in the most sustainable manner, thereby satisfying community needs and expectations.

Your Rates Explained

What was the average increase in property value in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters?

As part of the 2021–2022 General Valuation which was undertaken by the Office of the Valuer-General, the City has seen a valuation increase of 2.01%, which is below the Metropolitan Council increase of 3.76%.

59.4% of residential properties in the City of Norwood Payneham & St Peters have had no change to their property value and as such, the rate increase for this year will be 1.98%.

How are rates calculated?

The amount of rates payable for each property is determined by multiplying the property value by a rate-in-the-dollar which is determined by the Council, plus the Regional Landscape Levy* (a State Government charge collected on their behalf by the Council). The calculation of the rates for the average residential property is shown below.

What does 'rate-in-the-dollar' mean and how is it calculated?

When deciding how much revenue it needs to raise through general rates, the Council considers the community's needs in respect to services, programs, statutory obligations and improvements to the City's infrastructure.

The total amount of money required to be raised through general rates is divided by the total value of all rateable properties. The resulting figure is called the 'rate-in-the-dollar.'

What benefits will I receive as a result of the rate increase in 2021–2022?

The Council is making a record investment in new and refurbished infrastructure across the City which must be funded, including the redevelopment of Payneham Memorial Swimming Centre and upgrades to Burchell Reserve and St Peters Street.

These multi-million dollar infrastructure projects are in addition to the \$11 million which will be spent on renewal of infrastructure such as stormwater infrastructure, footpaths, kerbs and resealing of local roads.

How does the Council determine the value of my property?

The Council does not undertake property valuations. This undertaken by the State Government through the Office of the Valuer-General.

All commercial and residential properties are valued every financial year.

What rate increase can I expect on my property?

How much your council rates will change will depend on the change in the rate-in-the-dollar and the extent your property value has moved compared to last year. The table below provides a snapshot of the property values across the City and the change in the amount of rates payable in 2021–2022 compared to 2020–2021 based on a 1% increase in the property value.
